Toxic Corner: Xylitol



Summer is the season when folks are losing weight to look good in those swimsuits. Oftentimes, low sugar diets are part of the weight loss plan. Unfortunately, pet owners sometimes share their low/no sugar foods with their dogs not realizing that one ingredient can be toxic to their pet: xylitol. Xylitol is a sugar substitute used in sugar-free gum, candy, foods and oral hygeine products. In dogs, xylitol ingestion can cause severe low blood sugar, liver failure, bleeding and death. Even small doses can be toxic. For example, 2 pieces of

sugar-free gum containing xylitol can be toxic to a 20 lb dog. Its effects on cats are unknown so best to avoid exposure for cats as well. If you have xylitol containing foods in your household, make sure that your dog or cat cannot have access to that food. If your dog were to consume anything containing xylitol, seek IMMEDIATE veterinary care. Call our office at (337) 269-4031.

Technology: Microchipping

If your pet were lost or stolen, how would you find it? A microchip is an inexpensive way to permanently identify your pet. A small inert capsule is placed under your pet's skin and can be scanned for identification. Registration with the national database is free, and we handle the paperwork for you.

We have reunited several lost pets with their pet parents by virtue of the microchip. Dr. Randall and Dr. Lyons both have their personal pets microchipped. Microchip placement does not require anesthesia and is given by injection between the shoulder blades. It takes less than 5 minutes to place the chip, and it lasts for the lifetime of the pet.
