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5 Ways To Protect Your Dog's Hearing

The acuity of your family dog's hearing far surpasses that of humans. Hearing is a critical sense to dogs, and when diminished, will increase dependency on the sense of smell. When a dog hears a sound, he can hear it without moving his head. Many muscles surrounding the ears help dogs get premium sound reception.

Unlike humans, dogs are able to change the position of their outer ear so they can focus on a specific sound. When a dog lifts his ears or turns them, the outer ear allows him to magnify



incoming sounds. Dogs with long ears don't usually hear as well as dogs with smaller ears, floppy ears or triangle shaped ears.

People hear about 20,000 vibrations of sound per second. Dogs can hear two to five times that number of vibrations. Because dogs hear sounds before we do, they often seem to warn us of impending danger. Heroic stories are often shared about pets saving

their owners or family members from fire, earthquakes, predators and intruders.

Hearing loss in dogs is caused by many of the same things that cause hearing loss in humans. Hearing loss may be a result of a variety of causes including infection, trauma, noise, aging, drug toxicity, and inherited genetic defects.

How can we preserve this wondrous hearing capacity our furry family members have?

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A Message From Dr. Mattox

Summer is here! Please take a few minutes to prepare for the heat. If dogs are outside and active you should monitor for and make attempts to prevent heat exhaustion. It doesn't take long in the summer heat; even moderate activity for more than a few minutes can sometimes be too

much. You can use a cool water bath to cool an overheated dog or provide a shallow plastic pool for medium and large dogs to use to stay cool. Dogs that love to play, or are very active **will not** self limit. As humans in Florida we are taught to drink plenty of water and to stay cool. Dogs have no concept that chasing the ball

can literally kill them. If your dog has been active for an extended period of time and is overheated for more than a few minutes, institute cooling measures than transport to our hospital for evaluation. Heat exhaustion does and will kill so please be aware and mange your pets accordingly.

Five tips below will help you ensure your dog's clear, unimpeded hearing:

1. Prevent your pet's exposure to sharp, unexpected noises. This includes loud, repetitive noises that can cause trauma in dogs and humans.
2. Shield or protect your pet's ears from contributors to noise induced hearing loss (NIHL) including: party noise makers, fireworks, explosive devices, fire and police sirens, hammering, jackhammers, always-on loud music, construction site activities, race car engines, airplane

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- engines and gunfire.
3. Have ears checked regularly and cleaned by your veterinarian.
 4. Monitor children and toddlers in the dog's presence so that doggie ears (like a child's ears) are not used to stash crayons, marbles, coins or other foreign objects.
 5. Provide well balanced meals containing the nutritional components your vet specifically recommends for your dog's good health and well-being.

Your dog will feel and perform his best when you work with your vet to do all possible to preserve his health, well-being, and excellent sense of hearing.

Vacuuming Sucks For Fleas



Vacuuming kills fleas and their parasites in all stages of their lives, researchers at Ohio State University say.

Researchers studied the cat flea (also found on dogs), the most common type of flea to latch onto family

pets and plague pet owners. The study revealed that 96% of adult fleas and 100% of younger fleas are destroyed after passing through a vacuum.

After such definitive results, scientists repeated the experiment several times to ensure that the numbers were accurate; further trials mimicked

the initial results. It's theorized that a vacuum's brushes damage the waxy outer layer of the fleas, the layer that allows the bugs to remain hydrated. Without it, fleas most likely dry up and die. Vacuuming, in addition to using a flea control product should clear the environment of those pesky fleas.

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What To Do If Your Pet Gets Poisoned



Your pet has just ingested something toxic. What do you do? First, take a deep breath. The more calm, cool and collected you are, the sooner you can seek the correct medical attention. Then get a handle on the situation by taking the following steps.

1. Remove your pet from the area.
2. Check to be sure your pet is breathing normally.
3. Collect a sample of the material, along with the package.
4. Don't give your dog any milk,

food, salt, oil or any other home remedies. Doing so will complicate treatment.

5. Never induce vomiting without talking to your veterinarian or poison control expert.
6. Get help. Call your veterinarian or after hours emergency animal hospital.

There are two 24 hour hotlines: Pet Poison Helpline (800) 213-6680 (\$35 per call) or the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animal's Poison Control Center (888) 426-4435 (\$65 per call).

Remember, a pet's prognosis is always better when a toxicity is reported immediately, so don't wait for your pet to become symptomatic to call for help.

Calling right away is safer for your pet and may save on treatment costs in the long run.

There's a narrow window of time to decontaminate in cases of poisoning.
