



What's Eating Your Dog?



Common Parasites



Mosquitoes can spread a parasite that causes deadly **Heartworm Disease**. It is **VERY** prevalent in this area and is easily prevented with once-a-month medication.



Fleas can spread tapeworm, can cause anemia (low iron in the blood) and skin infections from scratching and are difficult to get rid of.



Ticks can spread **Lyme Disease, Ehrlicia** and **Anaplasmosis** along with about 13 other diseases.



Lice (species specific), causes excessive itchiness and scratching, a dry scruffy-looking coat, hair loss and anemia.



Mites (species specific), causes itchiness, redness, hair loss and dry crusted skin lesions.



Tapeworms are usually caused by swallowing an infected flea. They are flat, white worms made up of tiny segments about the size of a grain of rice but can grow up to 8 inches long. Y pet may scoot and lick their behinds and you may see them crawling around the area.



Roundworms can cause a pot-belly, diarrhea, vomiting, weakness, belly pain, dull coat, weight loss and roundworms in poop or vomit, or no symptoms at all.



Whipworms can be contracted from ingesting infested or contaminated matter like food, water or flash. Itcan cause large bowel inflammation which can cause bloody diarrhea.



Hookworms are usually acquired through milk from pets' mothers or are found in contaminated water or environment. They cause poor appetite, pale linings of the pet's nostrils, lips and ears. Hookworms can get into the lungs and produce a cough.

We highly recommend year-round prevention.
