Alabama Rot

At the time of writing we have sadly had 2 confirmed cases of Alabama Rot in the practice area. The exact causes of this disease is still unknown, and extensive research across the world into it is still very much ongoing. The symptoms include skin lesions and sometimes fatal kidney failure. Most dogs that need treatment have been walked in muddy, woodland areas. Alabama Rot's full, scientific name is cutaneous and renal glomerular vasculopathy (CRGV). It was first identified in the USA in the 1980s. It is a disease that damages blood vessels in the skin and kidney. It causes blood to clot in the vessels which damages the lining and the delicate tissues of the kidneys. It can affect any dog of any breed, age, or size. More cases are reported between November and May than between June and October, which suggests the dogs are more likely to be affected in winter and spring.

The first signs you may notice if your dog has contracted Alabama rot are lesions on the skin. These could appear as a patch of red skin, or as an open ulcer or sore. These sores are most commonly found on a dog's paws or lower legs, but they can also be found on a dog's face, mouth or tongue, or on their lower body.

Signs of kidney failure include loss of appetite, tiredness and vomiting. If your dog is showing signs of sore skin or ulcers on an area of their body that is close to the floor (and you know these have not been caused by an injury) it's a good idea to contact us.

On average, dogs suffer from kidney failure about three days after lesions begin to show on the skin, however the time between sores appearing and kidney failure can be between one and ten days. The earlier this disease is caught and treated by a vet, the higher the chances of recovery.


As the source of Alabama rot is unknown, there is no way of making sure you stay away from the cause. Checking your dog's body once a day for lumps and bumps is a good habit for all dog owners to get in to, and checking them

regularly for the signs listed above will help pick up the disease as early as possible. Washing your dogs legs and paws after a walk may also help but it is not known if this will actually prevent this disease. Cats and rabbits are not thought to be affected by this disease. Unfortunately, where is safe to walk your dog is a question we can not answer, and we are not currently advising dog owners to avoid any particular locations. Although an environmental cause for this disease is considered possible it has not been proven with testing to date. Dogs cannot be vaccinated against Alabama rot

Sheep in this field! ...it is far better to be safe than sorry...

At this time of year when lambing season is in full swing, please be mindful when walking your dog. Your dog doesn't have to attack the sheep to cause damage, being off the lead and causing sheep to stress and run can lead to abortions, or the sheep suffocating by smothering each other. Dog worrying and attacks on sheep are becoming increasingly more common. It is an offence to allow a dog to worry sheep, this includes both attacking and chasing. Farmers are legally allowed to shoot dogs if they are endangering their sheep and not under control. It is so important to have your dog under control at all times when in the vicinity of sheep and other livestock. Make sure you put your dog on the lead when walking close to or in fields containing sheep. Dogs can behave in an unpredictable way around stock and it is far better to be safe than sorry.
